Introduction.

I'll be teaching our introductory course in macroeconomics, which builds on the concepts covered in your introductory microeconomics course. I prefer if you call me by my first name, "Sungcheol" or last name "Kim." Please read this syllabus carefully, as it may answer many questions you have about the course. Goals for Learning. The goals for your learning fall into a couple of categories.

< Fundamental Knowledge >

- ✓ Understand and be able to use macroeconomic terminology.
- ✓ Understand the basics of how the economy works in the aggregate level.
- ✓ Learn how the macroeconomic variables are related.
- ✓ Learn to read and interpret the empirical information in macroeconomic data, graphical displays, and tables.

< Application >

- ✓ Analyze the sources of long-term prosperity and the contributing factors to long term economic growth.
- ✓ Analyze the causes of short-term economic fluctuations (business cycles) and the mechanism of "fixing" the economy to restore full employment (low unemployment) and low inflation.
- ✓ Analyze the emergence and the effects of rising national debt
- ✓ Analyze the current international macroeconomic issues and policy debates

Office Hours.

I encourage you to come to office hours with questions related to homework or course material. Participating in office hours is particularly important if you find yourself struggling with the material. If your schedule conflicts with the office hours specified above and you want to meet me during other times when you are available, I ask that you send me an e-mail in advance so that I could be able to accommodate your needs. There will be no office hours during the first week.

Evaluation.

Midterm 30%, Final 40%, Homework 20% and Article Responses 10%,

Exams.

There will be one midterm exam and one final exam in this course. Both exams will be in-class exams. All are closed book, closed notes, and not cumulative. You don't need a bluebook. Unless otherwise specified, you may use any simple calculator with no programming capabilities. **Please be aware that in general no makeup process will be given.** For the Midterms, we will write a make-up again with documentation from a clinic or a doctor. There is no make up for the Final Exam. If you miss the Final Exam you will earn an incomplete grade for this course without any special reason. I will upload the old exam questions at Canvas.

Homework.

You will have 5 homework, and each homework is 4 points. Homework will be announced in class or on the course website, and you must submit hard copy. I will post answer keys for homework just after you submit them. You may discuss with your classmates to solve homework, but the **homework should be done by your own word. You must submit a hard copy in class at the due date, and late submissions are not accepted.**

Each homework has about 6~7 questions. Homework will be graded upon your correct answers and your work as follows: (6~7) 4 points, (4~5) 3 points, (2~3) 2 point, (0~1) 1point..

Article Responses.

There will be 2 article responses: **1-2 page + graphs**, and each AR is 5 points. For it, you will find a news article from a major newspaper or periodical related to a course topic taught in the class. I will not accept articles from aggregators (Google, Yahoo, AP feeds), nor from blogs or opinion pieces, even if they are hosted on news sites. You must describe, in your own words, the issues presented in the article, and then summarize how the material taught in class explains the information, events, or phenomenon in the article. This economic explanation must relate to a theoretical graph (one with some sort of equilibrium, like Supply and Demand, the PPF). The graph must be drawn and included in your paper. **You must**

submit hard copy including your article. Late submissions are not accepted. The sample article response and the form will be available at Canvas.

Participation.

Your participation is not considered for grading. However, you are strongly recommended to take part in all classes. You don't need Clicker in my class. There could be an incentive for the participation.

Grading.

The final grade will be curved. There is a (preliminary) grade scale on the basis of which we determine course grades. The grading policy of the Department of Economics sets the upper boundary for the Median grade in principles of economics courses at 3.1. We will maintain a median grade for this course in the 2.8-3.1 range (Usually 3.0).

Academic Honesty.
