Objectives: This course serves as an introduction to the principles of macroeconomics. Macroeconomics is the study of economic behavior in the aggregate, including but not limited to how the economy grows and changes in short and lone-run, and whether we need regulations or monetary policy. We will consider topics such as inflation, unemployment, business cycles, and growth. By the end of this class, you should be able to:

- 1. Understand and be able to use macroeconomic terminology
- 2. Understand the difference between macro and micro.
- 3. Having a big picture of how research topics in macroeconomics evolve.
- 4. Explain how economics behaves in the short and long run.
- 5. Analyze causes of growth and recession.
- 6. Analyze government policies and institutions. Think about why we need them?
